FACT SHEET

The University of North Carolina at Greensboro has the fifth largest student body in the UNC system. It was chartered in 1891 as the State Normal and Industrial School and was North Carolina's first state-supported school for the higher education of women. As Woman's College, it was one of three institutions, including N.C. State College and the University of North Carolina, to be consolidated in 1931 to create the UNC system. It was renamed The University of North Carolina at Greensboro in 1963 when it became a comprehensive, coeducational institution.

The University Profile - What's Available:

- Academically, UNCG is composed of the College of Arts and Sciences and six professional schools – the Bryan School of Business and Economics, the School of Education, the School of Health and Human Performance, the School of Human Environmental Sciences, the School of Music, and the School of Nursing.
- The University offers 86 undergraduate majors, 64 master's programs, and 23 doctoral programs.
- Jackson Library has more than 3.5 million books and federal and state documents, making it the leading public research university in the Triad. It was also named a Literary Landmark by the Friends of the Libraries USA, the first North Carolina library to attain the honor.
- The Weatherspoon Art Museum has one of the nation's finest collections of contemporary American art, with almost 5,500 pieces in its permanent collection. Major artists included are Willem deKooning, Alex Katz, David Smith, John Marin and Robert Rauschenberg.
- UNCG athletic teams play in the Southern Conference and have competed in Division I of the NCAA, the highest level, since 1991. The Spartans field 8 women's and 8 men's teams.

The Student Profile - Who's Learning:

- For the 2006-07 year, more than 16,600 students were enrolled: 12,692 undergrads (including 2,427 new freshmen), 3,132 graduate students and 808 distance learners.
- At the May 2007 commencement, UNCG passed the 103,000 mark in degrees conferred since its founding.
- Eighty-six percent of undergraduate students and 33% of graduate students are enrolled as full-time students.
- Total cost to attend UNCG for the 2007-08 year is just under \$10,500 for in-state students (\$4,029 for tuition and fees, \$3,427 for a double room, \$2,324 for a meal plan, and \$700 for books) and over \$20,000 for out-of-state students.
- In 2006-07, 3,262 students earned degrees – 2,198 bachelor's, 1,064 master's and 74 doctorates.
- The average SAT score of incoming freshmen was 1044 for fall 2006, and the average GPA was 3.5.
- UNCG serves more minority students, as a percentage of total enrollment, than any other historically white UNC institution. It is also a leader in the number of first-in-family college students among the system's historically white campuses.
- More than 65% of students received financial aid totaling \$98 million in 2006, with an unmet need total of \$23.8 million.

- In 2006-07, students volunteered over 57,000 hours of community service in a variety of opportunities, including 677 students who were enrolled in 32 Service Learning courses.
- Approximately 70% of current students hold part-time jobs to pay for their education.
- Sixty-eight percent of UNCG students are female, 30% are from minority groups, 3% are international students, and 9% are from outside North Carolina.

The Faculty Profile - Who's Teaching:

- UNCG is the academic and professional home to 790 full-time and 211 part-time faculty members, with a student/faculty ratio of 16:1.
- In 2006, UNCG faculty published 48 books and 552 journal articles and participated in more than 1,750 public performances and presentations.
- Of UNCG's full-time faculty, 51% are women.
- The UNCG endowment provides 24 professorships which enhance faculty research and salaries.
- The salary range in 2005 averaged \$64,000 to \$95,000 for state-funded faculty positions; endowed professorships allow UNCG to retain its best faculty.

The Alumni Profile - Who & Where:

- UNCG has almost 125,000 alumni on record - 84,156 women and 40,025 men.
- Outside of North Carolina, UNCG has its largest concentrations of alumni in Virginia, Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, New York, Maryland, California and New Jersey.
- Sixty-eight percent of alumni live in North Carolina, and 65% are female.
- Twenty-three percent of alumni (or 30,000) live in Guilford County, and 17% (22,000) live in Greensboro.

The Financial Profile - The Buck Starts Here:

- UNCG is state-assisted; its budget for 2006-07 was \$300 million, with state appropriations comprising only 41% of the budget.
- A recent study estimates that UNCG's economic impact to the Triad and state is approximately \$1.2 billion, including 13,500 jobs beyond, \$520 million in generated expenditures and income, and \$700 million toward human capital development among alumni with a UNCG degree.
- UNCG's endowment was \$183 million in June 2007 and ranked third in the UNC system. For 2005-06, it was 275th nationally among 765 institutions reported in the Chronicle of Higher Education.

The Research Profile - Where We Are Headed:

- The UNCG campus hosts 22 centers for research and service which support the work of faculty and students.
- In 2006-07, the faculty generated \$36 million in contracts and grants for research, service and creative projects, and has averaged \$30 million or more annually since 1999-2000.
- Research awards have increased almost 186% since 1995, from \$12.6 million to \$36 million last year.
- The Gateway University Research Park, the millennial campus being developed jointly with N.C. A&T State University, expects a \$250 million buildout in the next 20-25 years, and construction is under way for its first building - a US Department of Agriculture research lab.
- UNCG's SERVE Center, one of only 10 federally funded educational research centers in the country, received a 5-year, \$37.7 million contract renewal from the U.S. Department of Education.
